Course Description :

This course discusses modern criminological theories and the paradigms which characterize criminological thinking including the paradigms of positivism, interactionism, and socialism. These paradigms are the basis for the discussions of the theories of crime. These theories emphasize certain determinant factors which produce crime, such as social environmental, anomie, norm conflict, learning process, social control, social labeling, and political factors.
